

#### **RELIGIOUS ETHOS**

The College Mission Statement makes it clear that St. Malachy's is a Catholic school, which is dedicated to providing academic excellence in the context of a Christian community ethos. The College, among many other things, seeks to ensure that all pupils and staff experience opportunities for their own spiritual growth and faith development. In view of this, the following opportunities were provided: Be it known to all who enter here: Christ is the reason for all we do. He is the invisible presence in every classroom, made visible through our relationships with the pupils and with each other.

We celebrated the beginning of the new academic year with a Prayer Service and Mass for all Staff.

Mass was celebrated four days a week in the College Chapel at 8.30 am (on Wednesdays, there is Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament). In October we had the Mass for the Year 8 pupils and their families. It provided an excellent opportunity for parents, pupils and staff to meet in a spiritual context.

The annual St. Malachy's Mass, held in St. Patrick's Church on Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> October, provided the opportunity for the whole College to gather as a community. This year saw Bishop Treanor commissioning Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist from the Year 14s. The Old Boys' Association had their Mass for deceased pupils and members of staff on the evening of Monday 9<sup>th</sup> November.

During the year various year-group liturgies were held in the College Chapel to mark liturgical seasons or special events. Each year group had an Advent Prayer Service in the College Chapel to mark the end of the first term and to help pupils prepare for Christmas. The College staff had their own Carol Service on the last day of class before the Christmas holidays.

All year groups were given the opportunity to attend a Lenten service in the Chapel. Thanks to Fr Michael Spence for organising and leading the services and assisting the boys in their prayerful reflection on the Passion story. A group of pupils represented the College at the Chrism Mass in St. Peter's Cathedral on Holy Thursday.

The College continued to be conscious of its role in the wider community.

**St. Vincent de Paul Conference**: The SVP Conference in the College continued to go from strength to strength. The pupils extended their outreach programme to the local community by networking with other schools, raising money, buying Christmas presents and distributing hampers to local families, a vital aspect of the work of the SVP. The students were involved in visitations to the North Queen Residential, and performing a Christmas Concert there. Also work with Grainne House in the New Lodge, twinning with Newington SVP. A lot of hard work was put in by many people under the enthusiastic guidance of Mr. Mark Lenaghan.

**Diocesan/Parish initiatives**: The John Paul II awards scheme continued this year, for year 13/14 pupils, coordinated by Mr. Brendan Dowd. The scheme aims to encourage parish involvement, social awareness (involvement in the life of community and society) and an increased understanding of the teaching and role of the Catholic Church in the world. There are currently 15 boys who are committed to the scheme from a number of parishes (Holy Family, St Mary's on the Hill, St Gerard's, Glenavy and Kilead). They are

actively engaged in witness in a variety of ways, from SVP, Parish GIFT Programme and Living Youth Summer pilgrimage to Poland for World Youth Day, Youth Alpha, Offertory Collection at Mass, Working with Primary school children, Scola Sanctorum, Parish Folk Groups, Parish Stations of the Cross (Good Friday night), assisting at Open Night and promotion of the College Lenten Programme.

Other pupils were also involved in various areas in their parishes such as serving at Mass, reading at Mass, and helpers at the children's liturgy. Many of our pupils were also very generous with their musical talents and were heavily involved in parish choirs, folk groups and prayer groups.

**Fund-raising for Charity**: raising awareness among pupils and staff about those in need in our world continued to be an important feature of College life and providing opportunities for pupils and staff to concretely respond to the needs of others remained a priority. Fund-raising continued throughout the year, with high points during Advent and Lent. The pre-Christmas collections were focused on SVP, while Trócaire was the main beneficiary of the Lenten generosity, including a non-uniform day with a difference. Members of staff were sponsored by their classes to wear school uniform for the day, including some of the most senior staff and the Principal!. Over £2,000 was raised for Trócaire.

#### Retreats

Year 14 students had the opportunity to go on retreat in the autumn to Clonard Monastery. The Clonard Youth Team delivered their retreat. Each year 8 class had a retreat at Living Youth (Berry Street) in June and this was delivered by a team from Living Youth.

**End of Year Events:** The year came to a close for the Year 12 and Year 14 students in May. The year 14 Leavers' Mass was held on Thursday 6<sup>th</sup> May. It was an evening Mass with an invitation extended to family and friends to join the students who were leaving the College. The Mass was held in the College Chapel. It was a standing-room only occasion and a very moving one for all involved – students, teachers, parents, friends and families These Masses gave students an opportunity to look back and give thanks to God for the good things over the past number of years and also a chance to look forward and ask for God's blessings for the road ahead.

# D. FINANCE

The Finance and Audit Committee of the Board of Governors has met regularly during the year to fulfil all the legal obligations, and to examine the proposed annual budget for 2016-2017. The College auditors gave a very favourable report on the College's financial and accounting procedures in respect of the 2015/2016 year.

#### Pitch Account

The College operates an account for the letting of our 3G pitch. At 31 August 2016 there were fund reserves of £65,800. These funds will be used for replacement of the pitch surface in due course and capital projects on the school site.

# **Fund-raising Account**

The College operates a fund-raising account. Funds raised from the College's designated charities are lodged into this bank account and cheques written to the charities accordingly. Money is also lodged in relation to fundraising activities undertaken by the College, money raised for school trips and receipts from Parents for iPad payments.

At 31 August 2016 there was a cash balance of funds of £66,650.

# **Shop Account**

The College operates a "Shop Account" which includes commission from drinks vending and sundry sales.

At 31 August 2016 there was a cash balance of funds of £7,459.

### E. ACADEMIC RESULTS

While academic success is not the only goal of education, nevertheless high achievements in public examinations have been the hallmark of the College. St. Malachy's College is committed to each and every pupil who is enrolled in the College maximising his potential. Pupils are encouraged to set their own targets and to measure their progress according to those standards. The Board of Governors has a Standards and Achievements sub-committee, which seeks specifically to promote, celebrate and improve on academic excellence. Public examination results in 2016 were very pleasing; and the best on record. The academic targets set for the year were met and exceeded in most categories. This outcome indicates a sustained improvement at A2 and significant improvement at GCSE, reflecting the industrious efforts of our students, the support of parents and guardians and the dedication and professionalism of the College staff. At A-level, an impressive 82% of the student body of 111 who completed their A-level courses obtained 3 or more grade A\*-C passes (cf. page 54 this report). The subject pass rate was 100%. One particularly pleasing aspect of the results was that 109 students (98.2%) achieved three A- level passes Grades A\*-E. This demonstrates the breadth of study of Sixth Form in the College. One student achieved 5 A\* grades, 9 additional students achieved 4 A\*/A grades, and12 students achieved three A\*/A grades. Successes in A2 MIA and Physics placed St Malachy's students in the top achievers within Northern Ireland.

In Year 13, all students follow a broad curriculum preparing for AS examinations in three or four subjects. The subject pass rate was 98% with 56.6% of the students gaining 3 or more A\*-C grades at AS level and 98% gaining 3 passes grades A\*-E. 5 students achieved 4A grades with an additional 6 students gaining 3A grades.

At GCSE level (cf. page 58 of this report) 98% of the GCSE students secured A\*- C grades in five subjects or more. 95.3 % achieved A\*- C grades in seven subjects or more. 12 students achieved 10 A\*/A grades, 15 additional students achieved 9 Grade A\*/A and 3 more students achieved 8 grades A\*/A. Raising achievement continues to be a focus for the College, ensuring that students are challenged to achieve their best. A significant increase in the headline figure for GCSE passes A\*-B grades is worthy on mention; 60% of Year 12 students achieved this standard. Once again the College was represented among the highest achievers in Northern Ireland in Irish and Physics.

The assessment at Key Stage 3 in Communication and Using Mathematics produced some very encouraging results, again reflecting the quality of the College's learning environment (cf page 59 of this report).

The Governors, Senior Leadership Team, Middle management and all Staff are continuing to work together to ensure the upward trend at all Key Stages. The outstanding work and diligent approach, particularly at KS5 have resulted in a sustained improvement at both AS and A2. A tremendous effort was focused at GCSE with numerous interventions and supportive measures put in place. Extended opening hours and additional revision classes are now part of the culture within the College environment. The outcome was very pleasing with the College achieving the best GCSE and A2 headline figures to date. A culture of rigorous review and target setting is becoming further embedded. The use of personalised action plans and targets for departments, individual staff and students are impacting positively on academic progress at all levels.

# F. Departments – Some highlights from 2015/16

### ART, DESIGN AND MOVING IMAGE ARTS

# September 2015

In September afterschool enrichment classes commenced for students at Key Stages 3 and 4. Students interested in developing their skills in the Visual Arts were afforded the opportunity to realize their creative intentions in a wide range of activities after school on Wednesdays, with students participating in filmmaking, animation, drawing, painting and work in ceramics.

Student support classes also commenced after school on Tuesdays for students at KS4 and KS5 in Art and Design, to assist students in realising their potential in Visual Arts in public examinations.

#### October 2015

Five students from KS5 in St Malachy's were successful with their applications for professional training by the British Film Institute on the prestigious BFI Film Academy project. Throughout the year the students worked weekends and after school to achieve their qualifications and create a short film. Following on from participation in this BFI Film Academy programme, one of the students would go on to be successful in gaining a placement in a subsequent British Film Institute residential programme in Edinburgh, where he would be chosen to be director of a short film, devised by a group of students selected from regions throughout the UK.

# **26 November 2015**

'St Malachy's Students were Sensational Again with Unprecedented Success in Filmmaking. For an Unequalled Fifth Year in a Row, Moving Image Arts Students from the College Lifted Top Honours in Filmmaking at the 2015 CCEA Showcase.'

For the fifth year in a row St Malachy's students shone at the CCEA Showcase of the best film work from Moving Image Arts students in 2015.

Caolan Caddell and Chloe Anderson (who studied Moving Image Arts at St Malachy's) picked up First Place at A Level and Second Place at AS, respectively, at the event at Queen's Film Theatre on 26 November.

Caolan, who is currently studying Film Production at the prestigious Ravensbourne College in London, followed his impressive first place awards at AS in the 2014 CCEA Showcase and Cinemagic's Young Filmmaker competition, by achieving the top place in 2015 with his outstanding A2 masterpiece entitled "The Clown". Caolan's truly unsurpassed A Level film is a poignant exploration of the human cost of war, from the perspective of a soldier struggling to maintain his integrity, morality and empathy for others amidst the horrors that he must witness daily. With a captivating visual style, that would not look out of place

alongside films such as Shindler's List, and an allegorical subtext that is resonant of literary works by Bertolt Brecht, this masterpiece left audiences amazed and almost moved to tears by its poignancy.

Chloe, who studied her Moving Image Arts AS at St Malachy's College, lifted second place at the CCEA Showcase with her expressionistic exploration of the inner conflicts and anxieties of an individual, portrayed across the years, using artistic non-linear narrative filmmaking techniques.

#### **27 November 2015.**

To assist with their progress and to broaden their perspective, the Visual Arts Department took students in years 13 and 14 to the Open Day of The National Film School at Dun Laoghaire, where students toured the newly constructed digital TV studios, model making and special effects workshops with 3D latex printing, and the photography, visual communication and fine art studios. Students attended workshops on portfolio construction and submission, which later resulted in all three applicants who submitted portfolios for admission to the TV and Film Production degree course, gaining admission, with truly outstanding portfolio scores of 600 points out of 600. Students also toured the National Gallery in Dublin to take inspiration from works that included paintings by Jack B Yates, Roderick O'Connor and Carrivagio.

#### **17 December 2015**

'St Malachy's Students were Unsurpassed at A Level in Moving Image Arts with Unprecedented Success in Examinations.'

For the second time in three years, St Malachy's College was recognised as being unsurpassed in the UK in Moving Image Arts, as Fionntán Macdonald was awarded first place at A Level in MIA at the gala event in the Grand Hall at Parliament Buildings, Stormont. The event, which was hosted by the Education Minister, John O'Dowd, and was attended by winning students, their families, principals and teachers from throughout the UK, was a celebration of true excellence in performance, commitment and exemplary endeavour. Fionntán, who was also the top GCSE student in Moving Image Arts in 2013, is currently studying Cinematic Arts at Ulster University.

Fionntán's achievement means that the outstanding successes evidenced in 8 of the previous 9 years has been revisited. From 2005 to 2013 the department of Art, Design and Moving Image Arts has had students listed in the top 3 in N Ireland or the UK in public examinations. In 2015 the excellence of previous years was revisited, with Fionntán MacDonald achieving first place overall at A Level in Moving Image Arts.

In 2008 Declan Murray came 1st in the UK in A Level Moving Image Arts.

In 2009 Michael Donaghy came joint 1st in N Ireland in AS Art and Design with full marks in

all modules, whilst Rory McLean came 3rd in Applied GCSE Art and Design.

In 2010 Aidan Gault came 3rd in Applied GCSE Art and Design.

In 2011 John Kelly came joint 1st in N Ireland in GCSE Art and Design with full marks in all modules.

In 2011 Leo McGuigan came in 2nd N Ireland in GCSE Moving Image Arts.

In 2012 Leo McGuigan missed being placed first in AS Moving Image Arts by 1 mark.

In 2013 Leo McGuigan came 1st in the UK in A Level Moving Image Arts.

Fiontánn MacDonald came 1st in N Ireland in GCSE Moving Image Arts.

Caolan Caddell and Christopher Connolly came joint 1st in N Ireland GCSE Art and Design.

In 2015 Fiontánn MacDonald came 1st in the UK in A2 Moving Image Arts.

# 12 January 2016

Years 11, 12, 13 and 14 Art and Design and MIA students visited the True Colours CCEA exhibition in the Ulster Museum, to broaden their perspectives and gain inspiration for their work in the Visual Arts.

# 17 April 2016

Current students, staff and former students from St Malachy's College attended the premier of Leo McGuigan's first feature film, "Braxton" which sold out within hours at the Movie House Cinema, Dublin Road, Belfast in the Belfast Film Festival. The full feature length film, which was scripted and directed by former student Leo McGuigan also had St Malachy's A Level Moving Image Arts student, Matthew McGuigan, as director of Photography. The film, which has already won awards in film festivals in Canada, received rapturous applause from the assembled audience, that included film director, screen writer and former St Malachy's student Aiden Largey and award winning former MIA student, Conor Byrne, who attended with fellow filmmakers from IADT National Film School, DunLaoghaire.

#### 9 June 2016

Year 11 Art and Design and MIA students visited Ulster University's, Belfast School of Art and Design, End of Year Show, to gain inspiration from exemplary work, and develop an understanding of potential career options for the future.

# **June 2015**

Presentation of the prizes for the winners, and certificates of commendation, for the "Bin-Beings Art from Junk" competition took place in year 9 assembly. The students were praised for their wonderful imagination and creativity in researching, developing and creating fantasy characters from recycled material. Winners were Shea Walsh, Aodhan Gilmore and Jamie Goodwin. Aodhan would later further receive the accolade of having his work selected for display at Ulster University's Belfast School of Art, in a group exhibition of student work from schools in North Belfast.

#### 16 June 2015

The creative culmination of the endeavours of GCSE, AS and A2 Art and Design and Moving Image Arts students was celebrated in traditional fashion with St Malachy's Annual End of Year Exhibition and Screening of Student Films. The 2016 show was opened by Mr Paul McGuigan, a highly regarded creative Film Director and Executive Producer for the BBC. He spoke to the audience on the importance of creative endeavour and imagination and developing skills for careers in the creative industries, that continue to grow in critical mass, in the N Ireland economy.

#### **BIOLOGY**

Mr Jardine again organised a trip to W5 in October, where the Year 13 Biology students took part in a DNA workshop. This involved the students taking a sample of their own DNA, replicating a sequence of it using the Polymerase Chain Reaction, and carrying out gel electrophoresis to establish their genotype for the ability to taste PTC, a chemical similar to one found in cabbage, broccoli and cauliflower, which many people find distasteful.

The Year 13 students also took part in the annual field trip in March. They travelled to Carnlough, where they completed an investigation as part of their AS coursework (the last year group who will have to complete coursework in Biology). The students also carried out an investigation into the differences between two oak and larch forests in Glenarm Estate.

Teachers from the Biology department contributed to the Year 8 Science Club, organised again this year by Mr Corrigan. Pupils meet once a week at lunchtime, and carry out a range of interesting and fun practical activities. Teachers in the department again played a major role in the Joint Award (Duke of Edinburgh and President's Award) throughout the year, which is run by Mrs McAlister.

To help guide our current students in the choices they make about their careers, a number of former students continue to contact Dr Roberts with Past Pupil Profiles. It is hoped that next year, some of these Malachians will come back to the College to speak to our current pupils about their career choices. The students, who are taking a diverse range of courses at university and careers, describe their experiences of studying Biology at the College, as well as providing information about their course and giving advice for our current students. The profiles are displayed in the Biology laboratories, two of which were refurbished at the end of the summer term. The new labs have proved very popular with both students and teachers: the bright, modern labs have also been equipped with new equipment, including high quality microscopes, digital microscopes that send images to the students' iPads, and a digital flexicam to display dissections onto a screen.

### **BUSINESS STUDIES**

Business Studies was introduced as an ab initio A Level subject in St. Malachy's College in 1997. The first GCSE Business Studies class began its studies in 2008. Currently the College follows the CCEA specifications in these subjects. In 2012 AS Applied Business was introduced into the Year 13 syllabus. There is no Applied Business class in the College in 2016-2017, although in recent years it has been offered through collaboration in the NBALC. Generally there are 2 Business Studies classes in years 13 and 14 and one each in Years 11 and 12. This may vary from year to year based on pupils' subject choices. Business and Communication Systems has been introduced for September 2016 in a joint venture with the IT department.

The Business Studies Department is keen to explore links outside the College and aims to have speakers or events regularly.

The Business Studies Department invited Dr. Martin Kelly from Queen's University Management School to come in to the College on 11<sup>th</sup> May 2016 to speak to the whole of Year 13 about the various courses they offer and life as a student at QUMS. This was a very engaging and well-received presentation and provoked a lot of interested from our Year 13 pupils.

We were invited to take a team of Year 11 pupils to participate in the Stock Market Challenge at Grosvenor Grammar on 2<sup>nd</sup> March 2016. The College team competed against quite a number of other schools during a session of simulated trading on the financial markets, making decisions under pressure, taking calculated risks and experiencing the excitement of the trading floor. This proved to be an enjoyable and rewarding challenge which gave our pupils an insight into career opportunities within the financial services sector and helped them to develop important skills such as communication, problem-solving and working with others.

The St. Malachy's College team of Daniel McIlmail, Callum O'Toole, Diarmuid Small, Matthew McLaughlin and Nathan McLaughlin took part in the Stock Market Challenge.

In order to facilitate Year 12's work on their Controlled Assessment a visit to the Lisburn plant of Coca-Cola HBC Northern Ireland was organised on January 11<sup>th</sup> 2016. Our visit included a DVD presentation, showcasing the 125 year history of Coca-Cola and how Northern Ireland businessman Tom Robinson first brought the Coca-Cola bottling operation to the island of Ireland; a guided gallery tour of the main production facility, to experience a 'bird's eye view' of how the products are manufactured, bottled, packaged and stored; and an opportunity to explore the world of Coca-Cola, their connection to the Coca-Cola Hellenic Bottling Company, their commitment to Corporate Social Responsibility, and their involvement in the local community in Lisburn.

In November 2015 the Student Recruitment team from PWC visited the College to speak to year 13 and 14 Business Studies pupils. Two of our pupils began Higher Apprenticeships last Autumn with PWC and this, along with other post A Level options with the company was the focus for the session. Three of our year 14 pupils accepted offers from PWC and Deloitte to take up a Higher Apprenticeship in the autumn of 2016.

#### **CHEMISTRY**

A Level Chemistry: To expand our current teaching and delivery of A2 Chemistry, L McGuinness completed the following course at Queen's University School of Chemistry and Chemical Engineering. The Role of Chemistry in Healthcare was the main focus of the course and it primarily involved research into the drug discovery and development programme, delivered by Professor Tim Harrison QUB and Almac. Detection of recreational and therapeutic drugs - Professor Steven Bell. Spectroscopy, A-level and beyond - Professor P Stevenson. Preparation of aspirin and tlc analysis of branded analgesics - Professor Paul Stevenson.

In attending this course the Chemistry Department was provided with new materials, resources and new methods of delivery such A level content. New links and information regarding higher level courses and employment were also provided.

AS Chemistry students were taken to Stranmillis University College to take part in the Royal Society of Chemistry's Schools Analyst Competition. The competition involved three sixth form Chemistry students, carrying out experiments of an analytical nature which are relevant to everyday commercial applications of Chemistry, and relate directly to the A Level Curriculum. Each participant will be presented with a certificate by the Royal Society of Chemistry indicating that they have received an approved level of attainment in Chemical Analysis.

In Year 12 Chemistry students were invited to attend the RSC-sponsored event is aimed at GCSE chemistry students and comprised of a series of short, interactive talks from local companies who use chemistry in their business activities. The main aim of 'Chemistry at Work' is to show the many and varied ways in which the chemistry studied by children at school is used in the everyday world. The Exhibition will provided pupils with the chance to see chemical based companies and institutions presenting easy to understand demonstrations of their use of chemistry at work. It is hoped that this experience will stimulate an interest in chemistry, particularly in industry, and will show some aspects of the importance of chemistry. Years 11 & 12 are to collected coloured stamps on their puzzle card from teachers whose initials formed a chemical symbol for an element e.g. Paul Davison is Pd and thus Palladium. These teachers were asked to participate and kindly agreed! Pupils were asked to collect stamps only from teachers whose initials form such symbols and present as many as they can on their card to any of the four Chemistry teachers by the end of school day. An overall winner and runners up were chosen, based on time and the prizes are appropriately small, pieces of scientific puzzle-dom!

To celebrate 'Chemistry Week', Years 9 & 10 used an app called Junaio on their iPads or on mobile phones (in a restricted environment, C11-C17) to engage with posters using Augmented Reality and then hunted for their matching molecular models in the Chemistry Labs. The boys recorded their identification of the models on their puzzle card and presented it for marking to any of the Chemistry teachers. There were 150 photons (small packets of energy) for the winners. Actually they were Haribo! Year 8 students have been actively involved in Science Club and have celebrated the festive season by making Chemistry Christmas Trees from science apparatus during science club, with the help of Year 14 Chemists and Mr L McKringle and Mr Santa O'Callaghan. Students who attended Science Club regularly were rewarded with an end of term trip to W5.

### **COMPUTING**

# **Key Stage 3 Hour of Code Classes**

All Key Stage 3 classes got involved in a new initiative known as 'Hour of Code' during Computer Science Education Week, from 7<sup>th</sup> to 13th December 2015.

The students used their timetabled period to complete one-hour self-guided tutorials on their computers.

They developed small programs based on Disney's Frozen, Scrat from Ice Age, Angry Birds, and Plants vs. Zombies which got them started in the world of 'Block Programming'. When the pupils completed the initial basic tasks they went on to try more advanced tutorials in JavaScript, and developed small applications in Khan Academy or CodeHS.

The main reason why the department got involved in this initiative was to use basic programming structures to help nurture creativity and problem-solving skills, and prepare our students for future career paths in this industry. It was also a good opportunity to introduce pupils to Computer Science and designed to encourage coding, so they can learn the basics of computer science and programming.

The Hour of Code was organised by Code.org, a public non-profit based company in the U.S. dedicated to expanding participation in computer science. A number of organisations came together to support the Hour of Code, including Microsoft, Apple, Amazon, Computing at Schools, and the Department for Education.

# **Visit to CSIT - Computer Security and Ethical Hacking**

The Centre for Secure Information Technologies (CSIT) offered us the opportunity of a full day course that educated students about computer security and protection. As part of this education, students would be shown how to defend computer systems and networks and learn techniques that may allow them to circumvent computer security defences.

The TEACH programme, which is the technical research arm of Queens University Belfast invited our Year 14 A-Level Computing students to attend a course based around Cyber Security at CSIT in Northern Ireland Science Park, Titanic Quarter. We were only one of 2 schools chosen for this event on 22<sup>nd</sup> March 2016.

The day was fully funded by CSIT and designed to reach out to schools that were teaching A Level Computer Science and had programming skill sets in this area.

### The day included:

- An introduction to the Cyber Security Industry.
- Legal and ethical implications of Cyber Security.
- Technical aspects of Cyber Security.

• Industry speakers outlining the career opportunities within the Cyber Security Industry.

The structure of the course was excellent and the pupils came back very impressed at what they had gained from it. They appreciated the quality of the information provided by the various speakers at the event and getting involved in activities on new and cutting edge technologies.

It was a great insight into the cybercrime arena as well as getting involved in demonstrations and practical examples of how easy it was to get through security loopholes, especially in financial and social networking systems. Sections on legal implications were really useful and not only tied in with A Level Computing Course, but also opened our eyes to how easy it could be to get criminal convictions by just having what pupils describe as 'harmless fun'.

The day started with an introduction to CSIT and cyber security overview and then proceeded with various speakers discussing legal issues involving Cyber Crime in areas related to computer misuse and web unauthorized access.

The TEACH Programme involved the demonstration of security penetration tools and techniques in an artificial 'sandboxed' environment using virtual machines in a laboratory designed specifically for this purpose. In these 'sandboxed environments', students were allowed to attack targets authorized by their instructors.

Students were given a series of hands on activities involving the following specialised software:

- Nmap Network Analysis Tool
- Metasploit Penetration Testing Software
- War Driving Software
- Wireshark and Wi-Fi sniffing Tools

The students then attended group seminars which discussed areas such as 'Responsible Disclosure' and 'Bug Bounty Programmes' as well as career options and pathways into a very fast growing Cybercrime Prevention Industry.

#### **DRAMA**

**School Play**: *Return to the Forbidden Planet* took place in The College Hall in November in collaboration with B.R.A. Tom Deazley, Oisin Thompson and Marc Cowan all deserve special praise for their contribution.

Year 13 and 14 Drama students also visited Trinity College, Dublin to see a play about The Easter Rising which originated as an A Level Devised piece under the direction of past pupil (and current under- graduate of TCD) Matthew McGowan.

**Ulster Museum** – GCSE and A Level students visited the Ulster Museum for a workshop about World War One

**Bruiser Workshop** – GCSE and A Level students took part in *A Day with Bruiser* at The Mac, Belfast working with local theatre company Bruiser on their renowned physical style.

**Open Night Performances** – A number of Year Eight and Year Twelve students performed extracts from *Mugged* by Andrew Payne and *One Man, Two Guv'nors* by Richard Bean respectively for prospective students and their parents. The boys involved enjoyed themselves immensely.

**GCSE Practical:** in April, the GCSE Drama class performed extracts from *The History Boys, The Lord of the Flies* and *One Man, Two Guv'nors* for an audience of their family, friends and teachers in The Drama Studio.

**Year 13 Practical** – in April, the Year Thirteen Drama class performed extracts from *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest* for AQA Chief Moderator Pat Friday and an audience of their family, friends and teachers in The Drama Studio. Applying physical theatre techniques gleaned from their work with Bruiser, the performance was an accomplished ensemble piece.

**A2 practical** – Year Fourteen students performed their devised work for parents, friends and AQA Chief Moderator Pat Friday in April. Two groups performed totally contrasting pieces: a Verbatim piece on

Schizophrenia and a riotous physical comedy satirising students. As always, this event was well supported by staff and students.

**Annual Concert** – The Music and Drama departments worked together with Year Eight students to perform extracts from *Bugsy Malone* as part of the Annual Concert under the direction of Mr Stephen Kelly.

**Junior Concert** – A small group of Year Eight students performed short pieces from *A Midsummer Night's Dream* as part of the Junior Concert. 29 students took part in the RSC's "Play For a Nation" performing as The Fairies along with Belvoir Players as The Rude Mechanicals in The Grand Opera House, Belfast under the direction of Dr Bailie and Mrs McLaughlin along with RSC and Lyric Theatre staff.

The refurbishment of the Drama suite is complete and is much appreciated by staff and students alike.

The mentoring role of the Drama prefects was successful and will be expanded upon this academic year.

GCSE journalism students delved into the St Malachy's archives to uncover hidden information about the role played by St Malachy's pupils in the 1916 Easter Rising. They produced both written and audio reports for the Collegian and website, uncovering fascinating insights into the significant contributions and sacrifices of many former Malachians, including Eoin MacNeill, Seán McEntee and Major John McBride.

#### THE ROYAL SHAKESPEARE COMPANY

Twenty-nine of our KS3 boys had the privilege of participating in a unique project last year, where they became members of the Royal Shakespeare Company Dream Team for 2016. Playing a group of woodland creatures, they performed on the stage of the Grand Opera House - alongside members of the Royal Shakespeare Company (RSC) and our local Belvoir Players - in the final leg of the nationwide tour of the RSC production of "A Midsummer Night's Dream". This production was designed to honour the 400th

anniversary of Shakespeare's death, and it allowed our boys to work with some incredibly talented people from several theatre companies.

The Belfast run of the play was co-ordinated through the Lyric Theatre connections to the RSC, which were established by their Head of Creative Learning, Philip Crawford. The boys were trained by Dr Bailie, Mrs McLaughlin and Ms Niki Doherty, who is the Creative Learning Co-ordinator at the Lyric, and who was working under the overall direction of Ms Erica Whyman, the Deputy Assistant Director of the RSC in Stratford. Throughout their final rehearsals and performances, the boys were accompanied by Miss Hughes and Mrs McLaughlin from St Malachy's. The boys performed a song, dances and epilogue each night, and St Malachy's College was advertised in the official RSC programme which accompanied the performances. The boys, along with the rest of the cast, which included members of the local Belvoir Players, received standing ovations in a packed Opera House night after night during their run in June 2016. The boys were highly praised by the RSC actors and directors and in articles in the Irish News and the Huffington Post. We would like to thank Mr McBride, the SLT and the Board of Governors for allowing us to participate in this wonderful project.

### **FRENCH**

# **International Guest Speaker for French**

Lydie de Baulieu, a native of Guadeloupe, came to the College to speak to the Year 9, 11 and 13 students about the French speaking world beyond metropolitan France. It was a fascinating talk which highlighted the global nature of the French language and also made the boys aware of some of France's overseas departments. This was followed up with project work on la Francophonie.

# French and Using ICT

In the summer term, pupils in all Year 9 classes produced a short iMovie in French, the purpose of which was to encourage prospective parents to send their sons to the College. This will form part of the boys UICT portfolio at the end of Key Stage 3. Some examples of finished movies were used at a Staff Day as examples of best practice in Using ICT at Key Stage 3. The best of these iMovies will be shown on Open Night to promote French.

#### French Film

In January, Year 13&14 French students attended a screening and workshop in Queens Film Theatre on the French New Wave classic *Les 400 coups*. The Year 13&14 French students led and carried the discussion with such aplomb that it has given rise to a French film club which takes place at lunch time in the College to build on these interests and skills.

# French and Entrepreneurship

Year 11 French students got the opportunity to see how useful French was in the world of business when they participated in the Business Insight event at the end of June in the College. Students worked in teams to create and produce a product which they then had to sell. Those who could converse in French were able to negotiate the most competitive rates for their product. It was a great learning experience for the application of French skills in the world of work.

#### **HISTORY**

2015-2016 was another busy year in terms of enrichment activities for the History Department:

# • Year 14 History

Year 14 History students visited Dublin in March 2016 as part of our study of the Partition of Ireland. Our first stop was Trinity College, Dublin from where we embarked upon a walking tour of various historical sites associated with the 1916 rising. Next, we travelled to Glasnevin Cemetery, the final resting place of many notable Irish historical figures.

- Year 13 History students attended a series of Sixth Form conferences at the Somme Centre, Newtownards. The focus was Weimar and Nazi Germany (AS1).
- All Year 10 students visited the Somme Centre as part of their study of World War One.
- All Year 9 students visited Clifton Street Graveyard.

In June 2016 Year 9 students produced iMovies to promote a local historical gem – Clifton Street Graveyard. The Graveyard marks the final resting place of a diverse range of Belfast people from all walks of life: United Irishmen, cholera victims, social reformers and millionaires. The boys were led on a guided tour of this historical site, visiting the graves of Mary Anne McCracken, her brother Henry Joy McCracken and William Drennan as well as the mass grave for cholera and famine victims. They also learned about the local entrepreneurs who played a leading role in the development of nineteenth century Belfast and the gruesome practice of body snatching which took place after the graveyard opened.

• All Year 8 students participated in a historical tour of Carrickfergus Castle. In April 2016 Year 8 classes visited Carrickfergus Castle as part of their study of 'The Normans in Ireland'. On arrival, the boys were led on a guided tour of the site, highlighting reasons for the construction of the castle at Carrickfergus, defensive features and methods of attack. We were also able to explore the battlements which provide an excellent vantage point across Belfast Lough. Particular highlights of the tour included the spiral staircase (luckily we all survived the trip step!) and the opportunities to handle replica Norman weaponry.

### Other news

- Year 8 History curriculum: initial focus on the study of the history of the College with the emphasis on its origins and first students. We also explored the development of the College and famous past pupils. The module was completed with a tour of the College. We have enhanced this study of St. Malachy's this year with the addition of an interview with College Archivist Gerry McNamee and the integration of CEIAG in terms of History and possible careers
- We started a KS3 History Club which is attracting some loyal members.
- We are planning an overseas History visit to Berlin for KS5 historians.

### **HOME ECONOMICS**

September 2015 saw the start of A-Level Health and Social Care. The AS examination was sat in June 2016 with the pupil achieving a B grade. 17 pupils in Year 12 successfully completed the practical exam in February achieving outstanding marks as a result in their controlled assessment. The boys produced a 3 course meal with sides in 2½hours and all the food they made was beautiful. A complete credit to them! They sat their exam in May and achieved 94% A\*- C/ 88% A\*- B. We now have 6 pupils pursuing A-Level Nutrition and Food Science in BRA, starting September 2016.

Niall Mc Daid did the Home Economics Department proud by becoming a Regional Winner in the Diary Council 2016 Young Cook of the Year. The final took place in Holy Cross College, Strabane on 19th April 2016. Niall made an Irish Cheddar Cheese and Tomato Quiche with a Thyme Crust with a Homemade Lemon Curd Cheesecake for dessert. Niall's food was delicious and he worked very hard beforehand practising to get to such a high standard.

Adam Burns and Padraig Slane successfully progressed to the final of the 'Kitchen Whizz Kids 2015' Cookery Competition. The final took place on the 10th November 2015 in Abbey Community College and the boys chose to make a main course for the judges. Adam and Padraig made a beautiful Cheese and Ham Quiche in a competitive environment and made St. Malachy's College very proud of their efforts.

On 5th February 2016, the Home Economics Department went on their first trip. 30 Year 10 pupils along with Mrs Mulvaney and Mrs Mc Cann visited the Tayto Factory in Tandragee. We toured the factory to observe the different stages and processes that take place from farm to shop. We got real insight into the high levels of hygiene and safety, the cooking process, storage conditions and marketing procedures. It also gave a practical awareness of the different careers available.

This year saw the start of the Survival Cookery Course as part of the Enrichment programme for Year 13 students. The pupils have 2 x 8 week blocks whereby they were able to choose different activities to take part in, one being the Survival Cooking. Throughout this time they learnt how to cook for themselves in university, how to budget money and to make healthier food choices. Meals such as Spaghetti Bolognese, Chicken Curry, homemade burgers, scones and brownies were made and the boys thoroughly enjoyed the chance to develop and practise their cookery skills.

7th April 2016 saw the start of a six-week afterschool cookery club. Five Year 12 'Home Economics Mentors' ran the club. Year 8-10 pupils learned how to make a range of desserts including Raspberry and Chocolate Cheesecake, Strawberry Sponge Cake, Chocolate Mousse, Chocolate Chip Cookies, Viennesse Biscuits and Brownies. Sean Marley, Conor Mc Auley, Daire O' Neill, Jason Mc Grady, Connor O' Reilly and Niall Dickson were great role models, demonstrating impressive practical skills and teaching the junior pupils how to make these dishes. A thoroughly enjoyable few weeks in Home Economics!

In Year 8 Garric MacAdhaimh was 2<sup>nd</sup> in poetry, and Odhran McKee and Corey Logan were placed 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> respectively in the conversation competition. In Year 9 Ciaran Corr was awarded 1<sup>st</sup> place in conversation. As part of Seachtain na Gaeilge, Irish students in St Malachy's had the opportunity to have their hard work and enthusiasm for the Irish language rewarded at the school's annual Bronnadh na bhFáinní (Fáinne Presentation).

The strong tradition of Irish in the College continues to shine through, and this was reflected in the large numbers of certificates awarded at the ceremony. In September, a group of Year 13 and 14 Irish students visited Parklodge and St Thérèse de Lisieux Primary Schools to teach the students a few words of Irish. The boys proved to be excellent ambassadors representing the Irish department. They taught the boys a selection of Irish phrases, songs and poems, and teachers commended the students for their enthusiasm and manner.

#### Lá Staidéir AS

In March, a group of 14 AS Irish got the opportunity to attend a study day organised by the University of Ulster. This day was very important as it focused on exam technique and future careers in the Irish language sector. The boys also got to meet Irish language singer and Youtube sensation, J.J Ó Dochartaigh.

# Crosóga Bhríde at An Cumann Gaelach

To mark the Feast of St. Brigid (1st February), the boys of An Cumann Gaelach (Irish Club) were busy making Crosóga Bríde (St Brigid's Crosses). This has become an annual event at the club with a few teachers even placing an order for next year with the boys!

### **GCSE Success**

Two Irish students were recipients of CCEA top three in Northern Ireland for GCSE Irish in summer 2016. Rory Brolly was joint 1<sup>st</sup> in Irish and Oran McNally was awarded joint third place. An amazing accomplishment of which we are extremely proud within the Irish Department.

### LEARNING FOR LIFE AND WORK (LLW)

2015-16 was another busy year for the Learning for Life and Work Department.

At Key Stage 3 the new revised Year 8 programme was rolled out to all five classes. As part of the evaluation process feedback and exemplar work were collected from all the teachers involved at several points in the year. The evidence showed that a wide range of excellent teaching and learning were taking place and that the programme was fit for purpose.

A further evaluation took place through the process of Student Voice. A sample of Year 8 students undertook a survey which focused on the integration of Thinking Skills and Personal Capabilities. The results of this survey was shared with staff during an August Staff Day.

Year 9 completed an interim Citizenship programme. The revised Year 9 programme, with integrated Thinking Skills and Personal Capabilities was launched in September 2016. It incorporates Local & Global Citizenship, Personal Development and Employability. A text book was purchased to assist the delivery of this course.

The department focus for 2016-17 is marking for improvement. A revised marking for improvement document has been written and distributed to the KS3 team.

Learning for Life and Work continues to be mapped across the academic and pastoral curriculum in order to ensure that the statutory requirements are met.

At Key Stage 4 LLW forms part of the pastoral programme. In Year 11 a study skills programme covers elements of the Personal Development and Employability requirements. In Year 12 the students complete the Local and Global Citizenship section of the LLW GCSE. They are provided with materials from CCEA to deliver this course.

At both Key Stages a large portion of the Employability requirements are delivered by the Careers Department.

Moving forward through 2016-17

The HOD Patricia Marcus continues to be a GCSE examiner for LLW (CCEA). In addition she was part of the team accrediting the new GCSE for CCEA (Qualifications).

Pupil voice will continue to be employed in Years 8 & 9 to review and improve the programmes. All members of the KS3 teaching team have been invited to take part in 'trusted colleague network' observations. As part of PRSD the HOD will observe each of the KS3 teaching team based on the department focus of marking.

#### **MATHEMATICS**

# **UKMT Team Challenge**

St. Malachy's College is now the host school for running the UKMT Junior Team Challenge event. Miss Corr (Head of Junior Mathematics) is the event coordinator and has received much training by attending conferences in England in preparation for the day. St. Malachy's College welcomed 15 schools who competed in various team activities using their mathematical ability and knowledge. The feedback from teachers and pupils was very positive.

### **Queen's University**

The Mathematics department continued its links with QUB by attending a Team Challenge presented by the Outreach Programme. The team included two Year 13 and two Year 14 students but the competition proved to be of a very high standard and required much outside reading and knowledge. The students enjoyed the challenge and their feedback indicated that the Further Maths students were better equipped having completed their A Level in one year.

### **Collaboration with Business Studies Department**

In March 2016 a group of six Year 11 GCSE Mathematics students competed in the Stock Market Challenge project with a group of Business Studies students from the College. Prior to the event, a half day's training was given to the teachers involved. It was an energetic day which also gave an insight and opportunity to explore career options other than the university pathway. It was very informative for the teachers to make connections with the business world and meet with representatives from Deloitte.

# **Maths Support**

The Mathematics Department has been offering continuous support on a weekly basis to students who are experiencing difficulty. The KS3 and KS4 support sessions were offered at lunchtime and KS5 students booked in to attend study sessions in E1 with HOD during allocated free time. This deemed to be very successful and contributed to raising standards.

The department piloted sixth form mentoring in lunchtime sessions and Year 13 students attended the weakest maths group in Year 12 once a week to assist with teaching and raising confidence and self esteem for disengaged pupils. The group achieved 100% A-C.

#### MODERN FOREIGN LANGUAGES

The European Day of Languages was celebrated on September 26. As part of our outreach programme to schools in our local community, Years13 & 14 language students visited Our Lady of Lourdes, Park Lodge and St Thérèse de Lisieux primary schools to teach introductory language classes in French, Spanish and Irish. This is always a great 'hit' with the primary schools and an opportunity for our Sixth year students to act as ambassadors for languages.

Meanwhile there were lots of things going on in and around the College. The Hazelwood choir sang in different languages for us at break time. The Home Economics room was turned into a French café for the morning- Yolaine, the French Assistant demonstrated how to cook crêpes and the Junior classes did a languages treasure hunt in the quad, and there were food tastings in the French, Spanish and Irish classrooms throughout the day.

# **Digital Training in Languages**

In June 2016, representatives of the French, Irish and Spanish Departments in the College attended the NICILT Digital Language Learning Day at Queen's University, Belfast. The teachers looked at the purposeful use of technology in the classroom, promoting listening and speaking skills using iPads and had a whistle stop tour of apps, websites and QR codes. This was followed up by a meeting to share good practice within the Languages Department.

### **MUSIC**

In the academic year 2015-2016 the Music Department continued to thrive and attract students throughout the College, encouraging them to reach their potential musically. It is more difficult to sustain the discipline of rehearsal and individual practice with the distractions of modern life and we are continually impressed with the tenacity and resilience of the young musicians.

The Annual Christmas concert this year was once again a Carol service in Sacred Heart Church, with additional music by the Jazz Band after the service. Lessons were read by representatives of each year group. The Year 8 students were invited to participate and many sang in this event.

The Spring Concert was held in Holy Cross Church and on this occasion almost all of Year 8 sang, with some acting, excerpts from 'Bugsy Malone'.

Many students took part in Ballymena Festival, notably the Training Orchestra and some individual entries. It was a great experience and there were some medals and cups brought back to the College. ABRSM entries were numerous with many students achieving merit and distinction grades.

There were many successes in traditional and Rock School grades also.

There was a small class at AS which continued its studies at Aquinas. Mr McBride assisted in the Department in the teaching of A2 composition. The students had the privilege of having their work performed and later recorded by a quartet from the Ulster Orchestra.

The students continue to avail of the extra-curricular programme including Senior Orchestra, Training Orchestra, a new SATB choir, Traditional group, Brass and woodwind groups, string quartets and Jazz Band, all of which meet weekly for rehearsal. A new guitar group was formed.

The Jazz Band was out and about, including a prestigious event for NSPCC in St Anne's Cathedral concert and an open air gig in the Quad. Staff and patients from the Mater Hospital also enjoyed the experience of looking on, and have asked that we make this a more frequent occurrence! The brass group played for some dignitaries at an event in the Hilton Hotel at Christmas.

The tutors continue to support the work of the Music Department and we were pleased to have Mr Shaw (oboe), Mr Irvine (flute), Mr Thompson (clarinet), Mr McErlean (bassoon), Mr Griffin and Mrs McLeod (violin), Mrs Griffin and Mrs Brady (cello), Mr Briscoe (trumpet), Phil Tinney (trumpet), Mr Wall (horn), Mrs Sweet (trombone), Mr Sykes (drums), Mr Breen (electric guitar), Mr Teirney (guitar), Mrs Firth (piano), Dr Brown (piano) and Mr Seamas O'Labhradha (traditional). The new choir tutor and singing teacher, replacing Mr Mills was Mr Mark McGrath. The pipes and drums lessons have continued to be provided by the RPBANI. The group of boys from St Malachy's College regularly meet with pipers and drummers from BRA and Campbell College. Thanks to Winston Pollock for co-ordinating these lessons and groups.

The College Orchestra was conducted for the first two terms by Miss Lowry, assisted by Mr Griffin, who often took the strings, Senior Choir by Mr McGrath, Brass group by Mr Briscoe and string quartets taken by Mr Griffin and Mrs McLeod. Mr O'Labhradha continued with the traditional group, Mr Shaw directed the woodwind ensemble while Mr Davison took the Jazz Band and Miss Lowry the Training orchestra. A new guitar group was created by Mr Tierney which was well received at the Annual concert. Adam McCambridge (year 10) has established a cello quartet, which meets weekly. The junior groups continue to meet until the end of the school year. The Junior Concert, in the Chapel was a fitting end to the year's work and was greatly enjoyed by all.

Students continue to be actively involved with external bodies, especially the CBYO, (12 students) NYO (Matthew Kendell), UYC, (6 students) UYJO (Ronan Doherty), UYO (6 students) and Concert Band at CBSM (4 students).

### **Voices in Unity**

This 40 strong choir, made up of students from St Malachy's and Hazelwood continues to exist, performing first at the Hazelwood Carol Service and later at Fortwilliam Golf Club. The choir was also invited to take part in a concert in Holy Cross Church with Barry Douglas in late December. There were opportunities for Carol singing at Tesco Newtownabbay and at the newly refurbished Carlisle Centre in Carlisle Circus.

# **Belfast Opera**

There was a singing workshop with past Head of Music, Donal McCrisken from Belfast Opera, bringing with him some I Opera singers. The students from Year 8-11 had a wonderful time re-working some scenes from La Traviata. The students were then invited to join the chorus of this group which meets in the Carlisle Centre.

### **UYC** workshop

Greg Beardshill from UYC came to the College to carry out auditions. He held a workshop with the Senior Choir which was extremely useful. 10 members of the choir were offered places at the UYC or TUYC for the Summer courses.

# **FISCA Competition**

In collaboration with Hazelwood College 20 students were selected from the choir to attend a vocal workshop and then took part in a competition in the City Hall in December. This proved to be a very worthwhile experience as we forged links with other schools. We were awarded £250 for our efforts. Megan Mooney, a local Opera singer was instrumental in our training for this event. The choir was invited to take part in a concert with Barry Douglas on 22nd December in the new Holy Cross venue.

### **Catherine Judge Bursary Awards**

After successfully passing through the earlier rounds, Matthew Kendell found himself in the final of this prestigious award. One of only 9 students from Ireland North and South, Matthew performed to an extremely high standard and acquitted himself with true professionalism.

### **Harmony North**

An initiative coming out of Hazelwood's celebration of 30 years, a mass choir, involving all schools from North Belfast. Donal Doherty was selected as choir master and 20 students began to attend rehearsals in various schools, working for concerts and tours. A launch in Girdwood for friends and family was held in April. A group of students travelled to London to meet with the US Consolate. A further group of eight students travelled to Washington to participate in Ireland 100, a celebration of 100 years of independence. The students were thrilled to share the stage with some alumni, Neil Martin, Patrick McErlean and Eánna Monaghan. Following this tour two students were chosen to represent the College as funding was sought for the next leg of the project. This involved a concert in Girdwood and an appearance on UTV Life.

# Irish traditional trip to Philadelphia

A group of musicians and singers travelled in March to Philadelphia, continuing in the tradition and link with Bonner/Prendigast Schools. The group was made up of students from Year 8-13 and they performed at the St Patrick's Day parades in Springfield and the City parade, on a float. Mass was sung at St Gabriel's, St Patrick's, and memorably at St Malachy's Broadway. New York. There were several occasion for singing the National anthem: at the Famine memorial, the Vietnam Memorial and at the 76ers game on St Patrick's Day. The students also had time for sight-seeing and enjoying time with host families. Thanks to Dan Harrell and his team who continue to support this alliance. Thanks also to Deirdre McCusker and Mark McGrath who accompanied the boys on the trip

#### **Student Council**

A group was formed, consisting of 2 musical students from each year group Year 11-14. After creating a mandate they set about various tasks needing done around the music block. This included: tidying and reorganising the music in the store, labelling the instrument cupboard, helping with advertising and organising the Annual concert. They meet regularly to discuss issues on going in the Music Department with Miss Lowry.

The Music Department thanks Mr McBride for his continued support throughout this year.

#### PHYSICS DEPARTMENT

The Physics Department was delighted to see the best GCSE and A-Level results in a long time this year:

100% A\*-B and 87% A\*-A at GCSE including Ruairi Moran, of year 12, achieving the second highest score in Northern Ireland.

100% A\*-C and 95% A\*-B at A2 including Tom McIver, of year 14, achieving the highest score in Northern Ireland. Tom then headed off to Cambridge to study Natural Sciences of which Physics is a large element.

We also sent a number of year 13 boys off to the 'Civilisation Belfast' event run by the Civil Engineering Department in Queens, which provides students with insight into civil engineering and encourages them to think of it as a career choice. This involves attending a lecture and a tour around Belfast meeting employers and hearing about the construction of various key structures.

The Physics Department ran a separate Physics course for year 10 this year, rather than the amalgamated KS3 science course. This meant that year 10 Physics was taught only by specialist Physics teachers. Mrs C. McGrath developed a new course for the year group which focused on the teaching of Science skills for the first term, which pupils seemed to enjoy. Once this was complete, Physics teachers launched into the GCSE Physics course, in order to get a head start before the students entered into year 11. This was in response to the difficulties the Physics department has experienced over the years with completing, in particular, the Physics section of the GCSE Double Award course. The department hopes this will make a positive impact on the teaching and learning of the GCSE course for this year group.

The new Physics labs and equipment are excellent for pupils and staff alike. The bright, airy rooms and brand new equipment, including departmental iPads enhance the teaching and learning experience of all Physics students.

Mrs C. McGrath worked with CCEA this year as a writer of the new GCSE Physics Specification, due to launch in September 2017 and also attended a three-day course on teaching and learning in Science.

Mr S. Granville took part in a literacy scheme along with the English Department, organised by Queens to enhance the level of literacy in Science.

Mrs C. McGrath and Mr S.Granville both attended the annual Physics Teachers Conference at Queens in June.

Mrs C.McGrath and Mr S.Granville from the Physics Department contributed to the running of the year 8 science club, by hosting it according to a rota organised by Mr R. Corrigan.

#### **PHYSICAL EDUCATION**

St Malachy's College has an unrivalled reputation for excellence across a wide range of sports. The College is a recipient of a 'Sports Gold Mark,' awarded by the Sports Council for Northern Ireland in conjunction with the Department of Education, in recognition of excellence in the delivery of curricular Physical Education and provision of a varied extra-curricular sports programme.

The floodlit (3G) third generation pitch has been operational for nine years now and is a terrific facility that benefits both the pupils and the local community. The College makes full use of the pitch for curricular and extra-curricular activities up to 5.30pm Monday to Friday and manages the community use from 6.00pm to 10.00pm during the week and also at weekends. The pitch is used for PE classes, extra-curricular sport, outside clubs and for students before school, at break time and lunch time. Due to the very heavy usage, the quality of the playing surface has diminished significantly. We are greatly encouraged by commitments from the Principal and the Bursar in recent meetings to address this as soon as financially possible. The PE Department appreciates the financial pressures currently being placed on school budgets but again welcomes the positive comments with regards to the potential for extending and refurbishing the staff area.

Usage of the Fitness Suite by both staff and students continues to increase. The Key Stage 4 PE students have benefited from an overhaul of the programme to make it more specific to their level of performance. The Fitness Suite is of great benefit when assisting in the physical preparation of the various school sports teams. Many players who are involved in College teams use the Fitness Suite before, during and after school. Key Stage 5 students have access to the Fitness Suite for four periods during the week as a break from their studies and to maintain and develop their personal fitness levels. In addition to weight resistance machines, cardiovascular fitness machines and free weights, the department has added Swiss exercise balls, resistance bands, skipping ropes, a punch bag, dip bars and chin up bars to enhance the experience.

Regarding examination PE in the 2015-16 academic year, there were two Year 11 and one Year 12 class studying GCSE Physical Education (AQA) with healthy numbers in each. The numbers for next year are very promising at GCSE and we plan to have two GCSE classes in 2016/17. We also run afterschool and lunch time booster classes to help those boys who are under performing or having difficulty with specific topics with Andy McClean and Kevin Niblock leading the way at A- level with the boys going from strength to strength. The PE course on offer is Sports Science, a new A-level course now offered by CCEA. This change, although it has been a lot of work and not without its challenges, we feel has benefited the boys and they will be able to achieve better grades due to the nature of the course. We also believe it is a course which will better prepare the boys for the world of work. The first cohort of boys has just completed this A-Level course. Mr Molloy, Mr McClean and Mr Niblock also make an excellent contribution to the department with their time and expertise in various extra-curricular activities.

The "Active Summer Programme" has continued to develop while thankfully the number of students involved has fallen. The project has been developed to target and assist students that are struggling with their weight and personal fitness. We have extended the programme to allow for earlier intervention with a small number of students rather than wait until the summer months. The students involved received a colour booklet packed with simple advice on diet, nutrition and hydration as well as a personal exercise programme with specific targets, in an effort to help them during the summer break from routine. This has proven to be very well received by the students and parents alike, with several success stories to report. Following on

from this success, the PE Department decided to intervene earlier in the school year, by selecting pupils based on their Individual Fitness Profile Tests for additional help.

With the availability of the fitness suite at lunch times, the boys have an individual fitness programme to follow in an effort to improve their basic cardio respiratory fitness and reduce their weight. Again this has proven to be a valuable use of time and resources with several pupils making great progress.

### **Extra Curricular Activities & Staff**

The College curricular and extra-curricular programme endeavours to promote a healthy and active lifestyle and lay the foundation for further development of interest in sport after school and in the community.

The well-managed programme makes a significant contribution to the physical, social, mental and moral education of our pupils and should:

- Contribute to the health and well being of pupils
- Help develop pupils' self esteem
- Extend the benefits of PE lessons
- Offer opportunities for competitive challenges and representative honours
- Contribute to the development of excellence

Tribute must be paid to all staff for their commitment in giving of their own time for our extra-curricular sports programme. The College offers a wide range of activities at a variety of age groups, by providing equal opportunity and encouraging high participation rates. Our extra-curricular sports programme is successful because of the commitment of our pupils, dedication and professionalism of the staff, the continuing support of parents, the senior management and our Principal, Mr. McBride.

In addition to teaching staff, the College is forever grateful to many past pupils and parents who also assist with sport development in the College and who, as proud Malachians want to maintain the rich sporting reputation of the College throughout Ireland and beyond. Mr. Paul McCrory (former Head of Physical Education), Mr Danny Fulton and Mr Michael McKendry once again have made a great contribution to the development of our Basketball, Golf and Water Polo teams respectively throughout the year, giving of their time, energy and expertise.

Mr. Molloy was appointed to the post of Teacher in charge of Basketball and Soccer and continued to do an outstanding job in co-ordinating the coaching of various teams throughout the school. This includes working closely with staff to ensure all our teams get an appropriate pitch allocation for training, that all games are played on time with a minimum of disruption and crucially that we ensure the boys who are out of class to represent the College are up to date with their academic work. Mr. McAlister has taken on the responsibility of Teacher in charge of Athletics and Cross Country.

### **Athletics and Cross Country Report**

### Inter boys victory headlines successful day at Ulster Schools Cross Country Championships

A young Inter boys (Years 11&12) team was the headline performers for the College on a successful day at Mallusk. Despite the top five finishers on the school team all being eligible for this same race next year, the St. Malachy's boys were able to see off the best teams in Ulster to claim the title and book their place at the All Ireland Championships in Sligo. This was a highlight in a successful day which saw all four teams capable of progressing to the All-Ireland doing so by securing podium finishes.

Tim Scott ran strongly to lead the team with a fine 9<sup>th</sup> place finish, which saw him selected for the NI U16 team for the London mini marathon. Cormac O'Rourke continued to improve in 17<sup>th</sup> place. Conall Browne was slightly disappointed in 23<sup>rd</sup> and Conal McClean continued to impress in 24<sup>th</sup> to round out the scoring. Matteo Lavorca continued his return to form in 27<sup>th</sup>, a place that would have saw him score on any other team in Ulster. Kieron Conway (51<sup>st</sup>), Colm Holbeach (52<sup>nd</sup>) and Gerard McCool (62<sup>nd</sup>) completed the team finishers.

The Mini boys (Yr8) found the step up in standard tough in their first experience of the Ulster schools, but did well to finish 5<sup>th</sup> among the top 15 schools in Ulster. Sean Murray ran brilliantly to make his way up to

7<sup>th</sup> place after being impeded at the start. Luke Kelly competed well to finish in 15<sup>th</sup>. Conall McGirr fought hard to a 46<sup>th</sup> place finish and Matthew Lavery justified his late addition to the team by completing the scoring in 61<sup>st</sup>. Cian McGrath (67<sup>th</sup>), Kelvin Kearney (71<sup>st</sup>), Anthony McGarrigle (94<sup>th</sup>) and Simon Ostermayer (104<sup>th</sup>) competed well in the 150 strong field.

The Minor boys (Yr9) secured All Ireland qualification with the team Bronze. The top three finishers Callum Morgan, Daniel McComiskey and Ruari Gallagher packed well in 17<sup>th</sup>, 18<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> place respectively. Fionntan Campbell was the best of the rest in 54<sup>th</sup> to complete the scoring quartet. He was closely followed by Conor O'Neill in 66<sup>th</sup> and Darragh Gorman in 88<sup>th</sup>.

The Junior boys (Yr10) were the surprise package of the day securing an unexpected berth at the All Ireland Championship with another team bronze by one point. Adam Ferris made up for his poor start at the districts the week before and was always in the lead pack throughout the race. He would hold on brilliantly to secure the highest individual finish of the day in 5<sup>th</sup>. Ciaran Beattie ran an exceptional race to finish 32<sup>nd</sup>. Fionn McQuillan and Keelan Benson completed the scoring in 39<sup>th</sup> and 40<sup>th</sup>.

The last race of the day saw the Senior boys finish a slightly disappointing second place to an excellent St. Michael's Enniskillen team. A combination of injuries and lack of preparation caught up on the Senior boys and they lost to a much better team on the day. Eoin Maguire put in a first rate performance to finish in 8<sup>th</sup> place, his highest ever finish in an Ulster Schools Cross Country. Connor McCann was disappointed with his 22 place finish and Darryl McNicholl competed well for 23<sup>rd</sup> despite nursing a few minor niggles. Lorcan McClean finished 31<sup>st</sup> and new team member Conor O'Rawe gained experience in 44<sup>th</sup>. Niall Armstrong did well to complete the muddy 6km senior course in 65<sup>th</sup>.

St. Malachy's AC members Eoin McCann (4th senior boys, Rathmore) and Tony McCambridge (8<sup>th</sup> Inter Boys, St Patrick's) ran well to earn selection for the NI U18 and U16 London mini marathon teams.

### Success at 2016 Ulster Schools Track &Field

Friday and Saturday saw the cream of Ulster Schools athletics converge on Antrim forum for the biggest athletics competition in the province. All the athletes on show had qualified by finishing in the top three in one of five districts.

Cormac O'Rourke produced a strong finish to pull away from the field down the home straight and secure the 2016 Inter Boys (Yr11 and 12) 800m title. His time of 2.02 was a personal best. Cormac is still eligible for this age group again next year.

Conall Browne ran arguably his best race to date to pick up the silver medal in a tactical Inter boys 1500m race. Conall showed his speed on the final lap giving the heavy favourite from Omagh a scare as he came up alongside him with 50m to go. Unfortunately Conall couldn't get past, but was rewarded with second place and All Ireland qualification.

There was disappointment for Eoin Maguire as he narrowly missed out on a medal and All Ireland qualification in a sprint finish; finishing fourth in the Senior boys 5000m. Eoin showed great character to return the following day and post a personal best for  $6^{th}$  in the 1500m.

Tim Scott competed well in the Inter boys 3000m; he was in the lead group for the first mile, before losing contact with the leaders over the final few laps. Tim managed a very credible 5<sup>th</sup> place finish and was rewarded for his effort with selection to compete in the U16 mile event at the All Ireland Schools.

Adam Ferris found the pace too hot on the last lap of the Junior boys 1500m, but ran strongly for 7<sup>th</sup> place. Adam's strong suit is his endurance rather than his speed, so he will be glad when he can move up to the 3000m distance on the track next year. Daniel McComiskey gained valuable experience in this race as did Ruari Gallagher in the Minor boys 800m.

Aidan McGeown mixed it well in the Inter boys shot, finishing in 8<sup>th</sup> place and Joe McGann ran excellently to make the final of the Inter boys 200m where he finished in 7<sup>th</sup> in 24.5s.

### St. Malachy's take a clean sweep of the titles at South Antrim District Cross Country Championships

St. Malachy's started off the schools cross country campaign in excellent fashion, winning all the boys team titles on offer at the postponed event at Ulster University Jordanstown. Crisp and cool conditions greeted the runners, but thankfully it stayed day and bright throughout the day. This is the first time in a few years that we have managed to claim all the team titles on offer.

Sean Murray got proceedings off to a fantastic start taking charge of the Mini boys race at the half way stage and extending his lead to nine seconds at the finish. Luke Kelly battled hard to the finish, narrowly missing an individual medal in fourth. Only one second separated Conall McGirr and Kelvin Kearney in 9<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> as they completed the scoring quartet. Luke O'Connor (14<sup>th</sup>) Anthony McGarrigle (17<sup>th</sup>) Cian McGrath (18<sup>th</sup>) and Simon Ostermayer (26<sup>th</sup>) all competed fantastically in their first schools championships and would have scored on any other schools team. The team had a dominating win, finishing first of 11 teams and scoring 25 points to Methody's 82 points in second.

Ruairi Gallagher overcame a mid-race fall to finish an excellent second place to lead the Minor boys team. Daniel McComiskey showed great speed and strength to nip third place in a sprint finish. The two were followed closely by Callum Morgan in 7<sup>th</sup> and Oscar Smyth in 10<sup>th</sup> to complete a commanding team performance. As with the Mini's Fionntan Campbell (14<sup>th</sup>) Jack Maguire (19<sup>th</sup>) and Darragh Gorman in 20<sup>th</sup> would have scored on any other schools team. Conor o'Neill was close behind in 36<sup>th</sup>.

The Junior boys had the closest team battle of the day, but moved up through the field brilliantly as the race progressed to overcome Methody by 7 points. Adam Ferris was disappointed with his individual silver medal after getting a poor start, but he will learn from this for the Ulster Championships. Keelan Benson (9<sup>th</sup>) Fionn McQuillan (10<sup>th</sup>) and Ciaran Beattie (13<sup>th</sup>) packed together well to secure the team title.

The Inter boys are probably our strongest team despite all the scorers being year 11s in this joint year 11 and 12 age group. Tim Scott ran a strong race to finish a clear second place having run most of the race on his own. Conall Browne pounced out of the chasing pack on the final lap to claim the individual bronze medal. The versatile Cormac O'Rourke showed his class to pick up a few places in the run in to finish 6<sup>th</sup>. Conal McClean continued his excellent performances this year to finish strongly in 8<sup>th</sup> place and ensure the team achieved the smallest winning total for the day (19 points). Such is the strength of this team that Matteo Lavorca, returning from a short lay off, in 12<sup>th</sup>, Colm Holbeach (16<sup>th</sup>) and Kieron Conway (17<sup>th</sup>) didn't count in the team scoring. Gerard McCool continued his return from injury in 35<sup>th</sup>.

The Senior boys team has had its challenges this year, losing a couple of key members to injury, but those who did compete did an outstanding job in a very competitive race. Eoin Maguire closely chased two of last

year's All-Ireland medallists home to claim the individual bronze medal. Connor McCann continued his strong return to form in 6<sup>th</sup> place. Lorcan McClean competed well to claim 8<sup>th</sup> place and new boy Conor O'Rawe finished up the team superbly in 11<sup>th</sup> place.

All these teams qualified for the Ulster Championships at Mallusk. The first three teams and 15 individuals in each race will qualify for the All Ireland Championships in Sligo.

Tim Scott and Eoin Maguire represented NI team in London Mini marathon in April.

Participants should appreciate and accept that being a part of a team carries many responsibilities. Accepting difference and sacrificing yourself for the good of the team are crucial in developing good team spirit.

#### **SPANISH**

It is pleasing that the uptake of Spanish, at both GCSE and A level, continues to demonstrate a largely positive trend. In the 2015-2016 academic year, in Year 11, sixty-two boys began their GCSE course in Spanish (compared to thirty-five boys in Year 12). In Year 13, eighteen boys started their A level course in Spanish, with a further twelve boys continuing Spanish to A2 level. We were very pleased with our second successive year of achieving 100% A\*-C at A2 level and also with the high percentage of boys achieving A\*-B (83%), particularly relative to the NI average (71.9%). A similarly encouraging picture presented itself at AS level – in a large cohort, with considerable variation regarding academic ability- as only two boys did not receive a grade A to C.

The quality of teaching and learning in the Spanish Department continued to be a primary focus, with all department members contributing, to ensure that resources were topical and of the best possible quality, and that assessments were both relevant and rigorous. Also in 2015-2016, we implemented the use of a Virtual Learning Environment with A level classes, to develop the boys' independent learning skills and to encourage them to take increased levels of ownership for their learning; given its success, we will continue to incorporate this tool as a teaching and learning strategy. Boys at all Key Stages continued to receive excellent additional Spanish support, if required, from both native Spanish speaking classroom assistants as well as our Spanish language assistant. Pablo Córdoba Huertos and Alba Coca Monereo, along with department members, provided additional lunchtime support classes for Key Stage 3 boys and María Serano has continued to be an invaluable resource and source of guidance for A level pupils, focussing primarily on the boys' spoken Spanish.

The Spanish Department again made a number of significant extracurricular contributions. For example, A level boys led Spanish taster lessons in local primary schools, and Key Stage 3 and GCSE boys were given the opportunity to sample Spanish foods, all as part of European Day of Languages. A final highlight of the 2015-2016 academic year was the inaugural A level Madid language trip, led by Mrs Rayot. Twenty-four A level boys (twelve AS boys and twelve A2 boys) spent a week in Madrid, staying with Spanish host families and attending a Spanish language school each day, until lunchtime; afternoons were spent exploring the many sights Madrid has to offer. As a department, we believe the Madrid trip had a most beneficial impact on the boys, especially in terms of their confidence, motivation levels and enthusiasm for Spanish. It is a venture we would most definitely be keen to repeat in the future.

#### **TECHNOLOGY & DESIGN**

It was another busy year in the Technology & Design Department. As well as offering a varied curriculum to all pupils at KS3, we had two GCSE classes in Yr12, one in Yr11 and AS and A2 CCEA Product Design.

We made the decision to move our GCSE pupils to CCEA in September in 2015. This was a risk as our Yr12 pupils were going to have to complete all four units in one year. Thankfully, with the hard work and dedication of staff and pupils, we pulled it off and were very happy with the results. In fact we were commended by the visiting moderator on the quality of our project work!

Our A-level pupils continued to follow the CCEA Product Design course. We had 15 students at AS level, which is very healthy numbers. The results were very promising and bode well for A2.

The highlight of the academic year again was the Sentinus Team R&D challenge. Four AS pupils, selected because of their interest in Engineering, had the privilege of working with Queen's University's Electrical and Electronic Engineering Department and NIE. The project involved researching emerging renewable energies, such as wind turbines, and the effect that they have on the network. The students were asked to devise a method of ensuring that transformers on the network were not subjected to reverse power flow as this can be an expensive repair. This was a really interesting experience for the students and opened their eyes to the vast array of opportunities available to them with QUB and NIE. They really enjoyed both the workshop days and career talks and lectures from QUB staff.

The College Open Nights in January 2016 were, as always, a great success. The pupils involved in showcasing the Technology Department were a real credit to the College. The visiting pupils and parents really enjoyed seeing examples of pupil practical work and getting to have a go themselves in the workshop!

The annual Art and Technology show was held in June. This was an opportunity for the AS and A2 Product Design students to display their efforts. It is always nice for their family and friends to come along and see how creative they have been. We had a wide range of products on display – from bicycle locks and car storage to redesigns of iPod docks and water bottle carriers. We were also able to display some of our new CCEA GCSE Systems projects.

#### H. CHILD PROTECTION

In 2015-16, the Child Protection Policy was reviewed and approved by the Board of Governors and was sent to all parents and information on Child Protection is included in all Parent Information Evenings. The Drugs and Alcohol Policy was reviewed and revised in line with statutory guidance from DENI. Child Protection is an important aspect of Section 1b of the School Development Plan and, in accordance with the plan, Child Protection Training was carried out with all staff in August 2015 and then, as required, with new staff. The Designated Teacher for 2015/16 was Ms Deirdre McCusker and the Deputy Designated Teachers were Mr Francie Toner and Mrs Stephanie Rayot. Two further members of staff completed Child Protection training with the Education Authority, Belfast Region; Mr C Heaney and Mrs C Devlin and also acted as Deputy Designated Teachers. Photographs and names of all staff within the Child Protection team are prominently displayed around the College. Mr Fearghal MacElhatton is the Designated Governor for Child Protection. Child Protection and Safeguarding is a standing point of agenda at all Board of Governor meetings.

During the course of the year, the designated teachers liaised with external agencies as appropriate, including Gateway Social Services and the Education Authority, Belfast Region Child Protection team. The counselling service provided through DENI by Familyworks continues to be well used. Much work has been done on developing and embedding a relevant preventative curriculum across all key stages, including provision for eSafety, Drugs Education and Mental Health. Mr M Cooke, as HOY and Designated Drugs Officer completed ASCERT (charity providing services that address the impact of alcohol and drugs related issues that affect people's lives) OCN Level 2 Drugs Awareness Course and Miss C Gault KS4 Learning Mentor completed a 2 day course; Young People, Substance Misuse and Mental Health also with ASCERT. Miss Gault disseminated the information from her course to all SEN staff as a CPD opportunity.

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As part of its statutory duty under article 4 (2) of the Education (Northern Ireland) Order, 1996, the Board of Governors has delegated responsibility for the coordination of special needs and disability provision in the College to Mrs O'Neill, Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator. In October 2015, following Mrs O'Neill's departure from the College, Mrs Deirdre McCusker, Vice Principal took on the role of Acting Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator. She is responsible for the day-to-day operation of the school's SEN policy and its monitoring and review, and the development and co-ordination of additional Learning Support Programmes across all three Key Stages of the curriculum. The College also has a Specialist teacher responsible for each Key Stage; Mrs C Evans, KS3, Mr A Douglas, KS4 and Mr K Niblock, KS5. An additional 2 Learning Mentors were appointed on a temporary basis for 2015-16. In 2015-16, the SEN staff had an increased role in fostering an effective Preventative Curriculum and more effective use was made of Staff Training Days for SEN staff with training on Safetalk (suicide awareness from the Education Authority, Belfast Region) and Learning Mentors attending courses on Anger Management and Anxiety Based School Refusal. The impact of this was increased support for students with specific pastoral issues. To further professional development, Specialist teachers, Learning Mentors and Classroom assistants availed of a wide range of courses including; Anxiety based school refusal, Effective Response to Bullying Behaviour, Promoting Mental Health, Writing Behaviour Plans, Risk Management, Assessment & Personal Handling, Safe Talk, ASD Level 1 and 2, ASD Level 2, Effective Use of CAs, Anaphylaxis, Epilepsy, Diabetes and Peripatetic Hearing.

The number of students on the SEN register included 44 students with statements (stage 5 COP), 56 students (stages 1-4 COP) and 272 students with Medical or Physical conditions.

Individual Education Plans were drawn up in consultation with each student, their parents and teachers of all those placed at stage 2 or above of Code of Practice. The progress of all was monitored and reviewed regularly throughout the school year.

To develop support for students who require help, but do not have learning difficulties as is understood in the Code of Practice, the SENCo and members of the Pastoral team have had to liaise closely with an increasing number of external agencies such as the Royal Hospital schools, Social Services, and Health Trusts. They also work in close partnership across three Regions of the Education Authority- Belfast, South Eastern, and North Eastern - particularly with their Educational Welfare, Oakwood ASD Service, Educational Psychology and Special Education departments.

#### J. CAREERS DEPARTMENT

The Careers Education Information Advice and Guidance (CEIAG) provision at St. Malachy's College aims to enable our students to become effective career decision makers, empowered to manage their own career development successfully, confidently and with due respect and care for their own needs, those of others and of the wider community in general.

#### Staff

There were three teachers in the Careers Department in 2015-16. Each has teaching responsibilities in other departments in the College. They are Mrs G McAlinden (Head of Department), Mr P McStravick and Mr B McCullagh.

#### **CEIAG**

The five key components of 'Careers' provision are:

- Careers Education
- Careers Information
- Careers Advice and Guidance
- Work-related Learning Experiences
- Development of Employability Skills

and recurring themes include...

- Self Awareness and Development identifying, assessing and developing the skills and qualities necessary to choose and implement an appropriate career plan
- Careers Exploration acquiring and evaluating information and reviewing experiences to identify and investigate appropriate career pathways and learning opportunities in education, training and employment, locally, nationally and internationally
- Career Management developing skills in career planning and employing effective decision-making strategies to manage transition and to make suitable career development choices, with the appropriate support, advice and guidance.

The Careers Department seeks to address the aims of CEIAG and each of its key components in its provision of learning experiences both inside and outside the classroom.

#### **Provision**

### Years 8 and 9

Learning for Life and Work (LLW) of which Education for Employability is one strand, is a central element of the Revised Curriculum at key stages 3 and 4. The Education for Employability programme for years 8 and 9 is delivered by several teachers and makes a positive contribution to the overall CEIAG provision in the College.

#### **Years 10-12**

The Careers programme for years 10 -12 is delivered by careers teachers, and is supported by two Careers Advisers from the Department of Employment and Learning (DEL). Scheduled classes, one period per two weeks, are complemented by a range of provision including careers guidance interviews in Year 12, information evenings, visiting speakers and participation in relevant careers events such as business insight experiences and careers conventions.

#### Years 13 and 14

Students in Year 13 and Year 14 are scheduled for one period in the two-week timetable for Careers Education. The focus for the majority of students tends to be preparation for Higher Education but provision is also made for those who wish to explore and follow employment or other opportunities.

All year 13 students are expected to participate in the Work Experience Programme which provides the opportunity to spend a week in a work environment of their choice during the second term. Nine pupils chose to participate in the German Work Experience and Cultural Exchange Programme this year.

Students in year 14 begin the first term with visits to Open Days at local and other universities, followed quickly by final decision making and completion of UCAS, CAO and other applications. A mock interview programme for Year 14 students is well established and aims to prepare them for an actual interview situation as well as supporting detailed research and sound decision-making. Students are encouraged to keep career plans under review and to use all resources available to them throughout the year.

Although students are timetabled for 'careers' classes the Careers Department supports opportunities for careers-related learning throughout the curriculum and the contributions of all teachers and all subjects to the careers-related experiences of our students are encouraged and highly valued.

### **Advice and Guidance:**

A range of informal advice and guidance opportunities exist in the College but the Careers Department provides more formal learner centred advice and guidance both at key transition times and on request. Career planning information is communicated for use in the mentoring programme to help ensure on-going and holistic support of pupils. GCSE and AS/A level Option Booklets are produced annually to help students with subject choice and students and parents are invited to Option Information Evenings.

All students in Year 12 have an individual guidance interview with a careers adviser and students in Year 14 are invited to discuss their Higher/Further Education choices before completing their applications. Any student may request a careers guidance interview with a careers adviser.

The Careers Advisers also play an important role in providing a series of talks for school leavers and conducting further guidance interviews for these groups of students. Careers teachers are available for consultation by pupils and parents after publication of GCSE and A/AS Level results in August.

The now established 'Enrichment Period' for senior students is welcomed by the Careers Department, and continues to provide an excellent platform for visiting speakers from higher education etc. It adds another dimension to the provision of careers information, advice and guidance for these year groups.

#### **Information:**

A broad range of relevant and up-to-date good quality careers literature is readily available to all students in the Careers Section of the newly re-furbished College Library. Access to the library is before and after school, at lunch times and on specific occasions during careers classes. The new senior school Careers Suite houses a developing year 13/14 careers library which facilitates use during class and supervised periods. Our students have the opportunity to access careers information through a variety of experiences but ICT is regarded a vital tool in addressing the objectives of the CEIAG programme. Students use the internet extensively and make excellent use of iPad technology to research and explore potential course and career pathways. The Careers Department welcomes the provision of the new C2k careers packages specially adapted for schools in Northern Ireland.

### **Work-related Learning:**

While recognising that work-related learning takes places through a range of activities, assignments and other experiences in the College, the Careers Department aims to provide each year group with a least one very focussed work related learning opportunity per year. The Work Experience programme, the Mock Interview programme and a range of business insight and enterprise events are highlights in the Careers calendar and enhance the relevance of the learning programmes. These experiences serve to motivate students, enhance their self-awareness, develop their career knowledge and career planning skills and ultimately help them make better informed decisions about their future education, training and employment. The Careers Department has built up an extensive database of contacts from the world of work and enjoys excellent support for all our events from local business and industry.

### **Employability Skills:**

Work-related learning in the College makes a significant contribution to the development of our students' employability skills. The Careers Department recognises that all learning programmes can effectively promote the development of communication, numeracy, ICT skills, as well as other employability skills such as working with others, problem solving, decision-making, self-management and managing information. Where possible and appropriate active teaching and learning strategies and the provision of opportunities where students engage as active participants and take responsibility for their own learning are employed.

#### **Additional/Individual Experiences:**

As well as inviting a variety of visiting speakers to the College and running the biennial Careers Convention, the Careers Department organises a range of visits and encourages students to attend a wide variety of conferences, seminars and lectures outside school. Each year individuals as well as groups of students attend events such as: University Open Days, Higher/Further Education Events, Careers Events (Accountancy, Healthcare, Medicine, Pharmacy, Physiotherapy, Engineering, Law, IT, Media, Construction, Hospitality), Higher Apprenticeships Presentations and Leadership Development Competitions.

Subject departments in the College also involve pupils in a range of visits, activities, seminars, competitions

etc. which give pupils a subject related insight into the world of work and into opportunities in further and higher education.

The annual 'Careers Diary' provides a glimpse of students' experiences and is available in the current edition of 'The Collegian' or on the College website and on request.

### **Parents:**

The Careers Department values the interest parents have in their son's future planning and recognises the positive impact of the involvement and support of parents. Through regular communications home we aim to keep parents fully informed about the careers programme and related matters. Parents are invited to attend information evenings, the biennial Careers Convention, parent/teacher meetings and guidance interviews after the publication of examination results.

Parental support of the work of the Careers Department is always welcome and we are grateful for the considerable contributions made by parents to our full range of careers related activities.

# 14<sup>th</sup>/23<sup>rd</sup> Nov. **Insight into Medical Multi-Mini Interviews**

Y14 pupils who have applied to read medicine at university took advantage of two different opportunities to gain experience in multi-mini interviews. In the first instance pupils attended an event organised by Dr G Loughrey and colleagues at St. Brigid's Parish Hall. This was followed on 23<sup>rd</sup> November by a NBALC collaborative MMI event hosted by Dominican College, Fortwilliam. Our participants found the experience very valuable in helping them focus for the challenges of applying to medical school.

# 22<sup>nd</sup> Nov. **Chemistry at Work Exhibition**

GCSE Chemistry pupils attended a Chemistry at Work Exhibition and Workshop in QUB. This relevant and practical experience highlights the applications of the subject in the world of work and has become an annual careers event for the Chemistry department in the College.

#### **PwC Presentation**

Opportunities at PwC were outlined for 50 Y13 and Y14 pupils who are considering a future in the business world. After introductions and details of the career pathways of the PwC representatives pupils gained an insight into the work of the company and the opportunities it can provide for its employees. A number of

those present indicated their intention to attend further information sessions relating to the Higher Apprenticeships on offer.

# 25<sup>th</sup> Nov. **Mental Health Nursing Open Day**

The Belfast Trust's Open Day on Mental Health Nursing at Knockbracken was attended by a Y14 pupil with a sincere interest in nursing. He gained an insight into application procedures and course content and met staff who spoke honestly about the rewards and the demands of the job.

### **National Film School Open Day**

To assist with their progress and to broaden their perspective, the Visual Arts department took students in years 13 and 14 to the National Film School Open Day at Dun Laoghaire. They toured the newly constructed digital TV studios, model making and special effects workshops and the photography, visual communication and fine art studios. Workshops on portfolio construction and submission contributed to the 100% success rate of our students' later applications.

Grainne Dunn visited the College to inform Year 14 students about the courses and opportunities available at National University of Ireland Galway and to provide an overview of the CAO application system for applying to Higher Education Institutions in the South. 83% of pupils surveyed after the presentation indicated that they were now more likely to consider applying down south.

Jonny Johnston, TCD Northern Ireland Engagement Programme Coordinator and past pupil and current Trinity Law student Paul McNamee visited the College on Wednesday to address final year pupils as they explore their options for studying 'down South'. As well as referring to facilities, courses and the CAO application system, Mr Johnston explained the new points system in place for A'level applicants and the 'Feasibility Study for A'Level Admission' which is continues to be in place for pupils applying from Northern Ireland for 2016 entry.

Paul, now in his final year, enthused our pupils by providing a very positive student perspective on studying at Trinity College Dublin. As well as referring to the structure of his course he described the new experiences he enjoyed as he met and made friends in the Halls of Residence during his first year at university and the exciting opportunities he has taken advantage of since then. His advice to Year 14 pupils is to seriously consider higher education opportunities in the South.

# 13<sup>th</sup> Jan. Health and Safety Presentation for Year13

In preparation for their forthcoming week of work experience Year 13 students attended a H&S presentation facilitated by the Northern Ireland Safety Group. As well as raising awareness of the hazards of the workplace pupils also gained an insight into career opportunities in the field of Health and Safety.

21<sup>st</sup> Jan. **HE+ Scheme for Y13** 

Under the supervision of Head of Year Mr Jardine, 17 Y13 pupils with an interest in extending their education began their involvement in the Oxbridge funded HE+ programme. The programme hosted by Methodist College involves pupils attending a number of 'extension classes' taken by local teachers – including Mr McVey (Mathematics Department) - and a 'masterclass' taken by Oxbridge lecturers.

### **German Work Experience and Cultural Exchange Programme**

# 25<sup>th</sup> Feb. Year 12 Options Afternoon for Parents and Pupils

Year 12 pupils and their parents attended the Options afternoon the purpose of which is to support parents as they help their sons make their A'level choices and to further inform pupils about the subject options available at this level.

### GCSE Subject Choice Event/Parent/Teacher Meeting.

Year 10 students and their parents attended this key event in preparation for making GCSE subject choices. Careers Advisers Mrs Anne Morgan and Mr Gerard Daly offered advice and guidance on how to make good decisions at this crucial time and provided up-to-date labour market information to support positive career planning.

## 9<sup>th</sup> Mar. UCAS Higher Education Convention

With the focus of their careers programme turning now to Higher Education, all Year 13 students attended

this convention which is organized by UCAS in conjunction with the Department for Employment and Learning. Over 90 Higher Education institutions and professional organisations were represented at this annual event which for the first time took place in the Eikon Complex in Lisburn.

### 11th Mar. Gap Year Opportunities with Project Trust

Project Trust representative Claire Jennings inspired Y13 pupils with her presentation that highlighted the benefits of taking a structured year out after leaving school and also the opportunities for taking a year out with Project Trust. Claire, who had taken a gap year herself with Project Trust recounted her experiences and shared how these have impacted on her personal development.

### 18<sup>th</sup> Mar. **Oxbridge Student Conference**

Three Year 13 students accompanied by Mr Jardine attended this annual conference which is held at Lagan Valley Island Conference Centre, Lisburn. The event is designed to provide up-to-date information on the application and admissions procedure at both institutions as well as providing an insight into student life.

# 6<sup>th</sup> Apr. **Medical Careers Symposium**

2 Year 13 students attended a Medical Careers Symposium

hosted by Methodist College Belfast and Queen's University Faculty of Medicine. The event included talks on entrance requirements etc. by medical schools, talks by doctors on a range of medical topics and on careers in Medicine as well as visits to local hospitals.

### **STEM Careers - Robotics Industry**

Y10 gained an insight into work in a STEM industry when they took part in a Robotics Workshop managed by Pat Jamison from Sentinus.

#### **Scottish Modern Universities Tour**

This second of two Scottish University presentations focussed on the more modern institutions such as University of the West of Scotland, Queen Margaret University, Edinburgh Napier, Abertay University and The Robert Gordon University.

### Options at 17/18: BMC/ CSNI Presentations

Senior pupils keen to investigate the alternatives to Higher Education and to back up career plans attended presentations given by representatives from Belfast Metropolitan College and the College's Careers Advisers. Application procedures and course outlines for BMC were detailed and information and guidance relating to training and employment opportunities was provided. Practical job hunting hints and tips were also welcomed by the 24 Y13 and 17 Y14 students who attended.

# 20<sup>th</sup> June. **BMA Schools Engagement Event**

Ten pupils from Year 10 and Year 11 classes took full advantage of the opportunity to attend this British Medical Association Schools Event at the Waterfront Hall. The carousel seating arrangement allowed pupils to speak face-to-face with doctors and medical students, hear talks on what inspired people to become a doctor and to get practical advice on overcoming barriers to the profession. Pupils also got to experience some simple clinical techniques using basic medical equipment. Following the successful pilot of this arrangement last year, Year 13 pupils returned to the College after their AS levels to begin the UCAS application process. With guidance from their tutors, pupils registered and completed the administrative sections of their applications. Pupils will complete their course selections and personal statements in early September.

### 25th Jul - 5th Aug Aerospace Summer School

Two Year 12 pupils made good use of the holiday period when they signed up for a two-week Aerospace Summer School at BMC. A packed itinerary included: a visit to Bombardier to learn about the forces of flight and the job an engineer does; a 'Composites workshop' and a tour of the Dunmurry Factory; an exploration of Unmanned Aerial Vehicles/Drones (UAV) and a visit to the Armagh Planetarium to learn about astronaut training; a flight in a Bombardier Aircraft operated by Flybe.

This was a great experience for two pupils who demonstrated how to take advantage of an opportunity and use their initiative.

### 29<sup>th</sup> June - 1<sup>st</sup> July. **Experiencing Cambridge Summer School**

7 Year 13 pupils accompanied by Mr McVey attended this annual summer school at Corpus Christi College, Cambridge. The group followed a full programme of activities consisting of information sessions on making a competitive application, workshops on academic interviews, subject lectures and tours of the facilities. All attended the University Open Day on 30<sup>th</sup> June to visit other College and further explore the opportunities and facilities available to Cambridge students.

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#### K. ARRANGEMENTS FOR SCHOOL SECURITY

(c.f. The Education (NI) Order 1998 – Article 15)

The Board of Governors of St Malachy's College is committed to providing a safe and secure environment for staff and visitors in the College.

#### Access

Entrance to the College property for students is normally only by the Antrim Road gate. The Lincoln Avenue and Crumlin Road gates are open only for limited periods at the beginning and end of the school day to facilitate staff parking.

#### Visitors

Parents and visitors are welcome to the College. However, all visitors must report to the College Office. If they are proceeding beyond the office, they will be issued with a visitor's pass for the duration of their stay on College premises.

Meetings between visitors and staff will normally take place by appointment. Visitors and parents are not permitted to approach staff directly in their classrooms.

#### Cars

In the interest of safety and to avoid congestion, parents are asked not to bring cars on to the school premises at the beginning or end of the school day. Only staff with authorised parking permits, or visitors that have signed in, are permitted to park on the College site.

#### General security

The College monitors every visitor to the College and utilises a range of security measures including intruder alarms, CCTV coverage and security lighting. The College employs caretakers / security guards to monitor the Lincoln Avenue entrance from the end of the school day to late evening while our sports facilities are used by external groups. These measures assist in providing a safe secure environment for pupils, staff and visitors.

#### L. CONCLUSION

The academic year 2015-16 has proved to be very successful on many fronts. We were able to celebrate the fact that all the targets from year 1 of our School Development Plan were met, with the vast majority of these being exceeded. In August 2016, the College reached new heights in terms of GCSE and A level performance. Our proficient gathering of data and the analyses of this have provided concrete evidence that we can continue to perform academically at the highest level, adding great value to the potential of every pupil.

It is right that we celebrate our successes in this highly competitive world but we continue to rely firmly on our great traditions and faith so that we focus on educating the whole person. Curricular and extramural life is totally infused with pastoral care and support. Strong partnerships between the College and the home remain one ingredient of our success. Our College motto "Gloria Ab Intus" encourages us to nurture resilience in our pupils, equipping them with skills which are necessary for adult life. We have observed our pupils becoming increasingly adept at following good routines. Attendance and punctuality are at excellent levels, and the pupils are evidently taking real ownership of their learning. Much effort and investment have gone into developing and distributing leadership at all levels within our College community, and all members are fully aware of their roles and responsibilities. Our approach here helps to maintain our renowned team spirit and camaraderie.

The renewal and refurbishment of our facilities have continued. E Block and the College Hall have had major facelifts. Staff and pupils agree that such work enhances morale and helps to raise expectations. We have in place ambitious building programmes for 2016-17, and beyond. The historic O'Laverty Library and its surroundings are to be renovated with the assistance of funding from the Heritage Lottery. More work will be carried out in E Block and we await the release of government monies to extend C Block, put in a new drainage system and resurface all of the College grounds.

I want to put on record my thanks to the members of the Board of Governors who continue to provide first class support and challenge for the College. The Board works very closely with Mr McBride and the Senior Leadership Team, and continues to encourage direct input from all members of the College. During the past year, we even had a member of the Student Council make a very impressive presentation to our Standards and Achievements Committee! On behalf of the Board of Governors, I thank all members of the College community; staff – teaching and support, pupils, parents and guardians for their hard work, dedication and support. The heartbeat of the College remains strong and keeps gospel values at its core. I have every confidence that we will continue to go to new levels, and in all areas of College life.
